NEW SERVICE AVAILABLE: DOWNLOAD LIBRARY

The Lee County Library System now has digital audio books available, the downloadable version of a book to your home computer. According to the helpful flyer available at the library, this service can be completed in three easy steps:

- *Step 1:* You will need to install free software on your computer. The free software is available from the digital library web site.
- Step 2: Next, you'll need to activate your free software which only needs to be done once.
- *Step 3:* Add a title to your digital cart and check it out. After you have downloaded what you want, you can close your internet connection and enjoy.

Cynthia Eagan paints a range of landscape, animal, and still life paintings in acrylics and oils. Her paintings are noted for unusual combinations of colors and strong contrasts. She exhibits throughout Florida and has won ribbons and recognition throughout Southwest Florida.



Quilt Artist Carol Elrod retired as a report for the Indianapolis Star in 1991 and ventured into quilt making, an art form that had intrigued her since receiving a stack of her husband's grandmother's bed quilts in the 1970s. She experiments with paints and dyes, computer-assisted designs, free-motion embroidery and quilting and thread painting. Her wall hangings have been shown in

Pennsylvania, and other east coast exhibitions, and received a blue ribbon for best pictorial quilt at the Pennsylvania. National Quilt Extravaganza.



Caloosa Carvers Club, a 100-member group of talented wood carvers, will display a variety of pieces of all sizes and styles. Its purpose is to stimulate and encourage interest in woodcarving and to provide an environment in which the members can learn, develop and enlarge their skills in this art form; to promote wood

carving via teaching, demonstrations, exhibitions and participation in local events.

April

Claire Amos, a watercolor artist from Matlacha, creates bold and bright work that includes everyday subjects like Florida birds, flowers, palm trees and sunsets. She displays on Pine Island at Pine Bay Gallery and on the east coast at Rainbow On the Beach in Hillsborough Beach.

Diana Rutherford's portraits have a down-home, Florida informality, combining intensity and sympathy with her subject. She is a prize-winning portraitist and her work is included in many private collections around the world including the collection of Jimmy Buffet. Diana has had numerous solo exhibits in Boston, where she graduated from the School of the Museum of Fine Arts, and in France, where she lived and painted for several years. Her work has been shown in Japan, the Caribbean, Arizona and around Florida. Diana taught art in Tortola, BVI; Cambridge, MA; the ART-SMART program for homeless children in Boston; and at the Lee County Alliance for the Arts in Ft. Myers, FL.

In the early 70's while touring Van Briggle Pottery in Colorado, Ingeborg's interest in clay was sparked. She studied clay, at the University of Colorado, attended workshops and worked to learn her craft. She lived in Grenoble, France for three years and attended the University of Grenoble, traveled extensively throughout Europe and broadened her horizon and expanded her knowledge or art and clay. After living in the Pacific Northwest, she continued her education in Vancouver, set up a home studio and became a member of the Oregon Potter's Association. In 2002 Ingeborg moved to St. James City and opened her business, a working pottery situated in an open air building where people can see work in progress. Her interest in clay is varied and ranges from high fire functional work, Raku, wood firing, hand building and wheelwork to glaze development.




Friends Funds at Work for The Library
